In this lesson, it is our responsibility to turn the negative message and lure of violence to a positive action of standing firm in our faith and loving our neighbor.

St. Juan Diego ignored the threats of the Church authorities and continued to do what the Virgin of Guadalupe asked of him. He was turned away again and again, yet he persisted in giving her message to the bishop.

Each week, at the Mass, we share the sign of peace with one another. It gives us the opportunity to renew our relationships with one another; it is a sign of reconciliation with each other.

The 5th Commandment states simply “Thou shall not kill”. Physical violence is just a part of this lesson’s topic. In today’s world we encounter many forms of threats against people; many are physical but more often they are not. Bullying is one example with which the children will be familiar. We can overcome this behavior by living the gospel message of loving one another.

Church Teachings	CCC: 2258 <i>Human life is sacred...from its beginning it involves the creative action of God...it remains for ever in a special relationship with the Creator, who is its sole end.
