



Employment Authorization Assistance Clinics

Legal Services Providers, in partnership with The Department of Human Services, Office of New Americans, will be holding pro-se clinics to assist with initial Employment Authorization Document applications for those eligible for Temporary Protective Status, Humanitarian Parole, or asylum.

What is an Employment Authorization Document (EAD)?

- An Employment Authorization Document (EAD), also referred to as a work permit, allows an individual to prove that you are eligible to work lawfully in the United States.
- An EAD does not grant a person immigration status in the U.S. but can serve as a form of identification.

Who may be eligible for help under NJ's Employment Authorization Assistance Program?

- Those who have been granted or are eligible for Temporary Protected Status (TPS) - Nationals of the following countries who meet certain physical presence and continuous residence requirements:

- Haiti	- Burma
- Venezuela	- Somalia
- Afghanistan	- Sudan
- Cameroon	- South Sudan
- Ukraine	- Syria
- Ethiopia	- Yemen
- Humanitarian Parolees admitted to the United States under certain programs like the **CHNV (Cuba, Haiti, Nicaragua, Venezuela) Program**, parolees from Afghanistan and Ukraine or CBPOne entrants.

Note: The Department of Homeland Security has announced there will not be re-parole for Cubans, Haitians, Nicaraguans and Venezuelan Parolees. It is recommended to seek other immigration benefits that could provide greater protection.
- Recent arrivals who have suffered from past persecution or has a well-founded fear of persecution in their home country might be eligible for asylum.
